A Message from the 2nd Vice District Governor Paula Hilbert







A Message from Lion Toby Gelman

Friends & Colleagues,

Our Beginning classes start Sept 10, with Intermediate and Advanced classes starting Sept 24 (the registration is attached so last call to SIGN up).

For us, Sign Language can be basic survival, but it is also art, spirituality, science, work, family, friends, and community!!

In just a few weeks, DealCAN! will launch our new website, a new logo, slogan

"CARE COMMUNICATE CONNECT COMMUNITY."

It has been a large investment, but all intended to reach out, find, and support more Deaf people in need. For most hearing people we engage, they are surprised and often say "Never really thought about it but, of course there must be.... Deaf people in prison, refugees/immigrants/ssyless, those who are Deaf & Blind, parents struggling with newly born Deaf children, Deaf who were fired, divorced, homeless, in hospice care... and yes, also doctors, lawyers, teachers, counselors all trying to make things better.

We are also 'building' a hybrid classroom to reach isolated, vulnerable Deaf people we can't reach physically, but CAN! SEE virtually, which allows us to Care Communicate, Connect, and build Community for and with them.

"From Isolation to Community" could have been our slogan, because that has always been an essential part of our mission. Our hybrid classroom will soon reach Deaf Refugees/immigrants/ asylees beyond SE PA. We also hope that Deaf prisoners, isolated and spread throughout the country in Federal, State, and county prisons, with no or extremely limited access to programs and services, might now be able to have 'visits' and attend classes they can understand.

Post (we hope) COVID technology resources not only help us to reach others, but finally other, essential, even if remote services have opened doors and providing help in Sign Language:

Deaf 988 crisis/suicide hotline,

Deaf domestic violence hotline, both accessible directly by Deaf people's videophones.

<u>Deaf counseling services</u>, and mostly Deaf themselves, that provide many counseling specialties, accept multiple insurances, and can team with local, 'mainstream' services to provide comprehensive and equivalent care.

Deaf people <u>now</u> do not need to worry about being rejected because of the cost of interpreters or misunderstood by professionals with little to no experience in working with them. Finally ("PAH"), <u>misunderstanding</u>, <u>mistakes</u>, <u>misdiagnosis</u>, and <u>mistreatment no longer need to be the norm</u>. The crippling dread of even seeking 'help' can now be replaced with <u>actually getting</u> it!

So, sure, SIGN up for our ASL classes, or put in a request for staff training in health, human services, criminal justice, employment, housing, or other arenas. DEI, diversity equity inclusion, is not only NOT a dirry word. In fact, it is what we all seek as unique individuals, to be accepted, included, and part of a community.

Also attached is a FACT SHEET that you might find interesting.

As with many other nonprofits, your support is what makes our outreach and service to Deaf individuals and families possible.

Lions around the world are working to raise awareness, bring medical care and provide education to help prevent hearing loss.

More than 275 million people worldwide are hearingimpaired or deaf, according to the World Health Organization.

Just as vision-related programs have been a key element of Lions Clubs International activities since before Helen Keller called on Lions in 1925 to carry out a "crusade against darkness," Lions have also been prominent in the battle to help people with hearing impairments.

It's an important fight. Keller, who was deaf as well as blind, understood the isolation that hearing impairments can impose.

"Blindness separates people from things," she once said, but "deafness separates people from people."

Deaf Fact Sheet

- The Deaf Community (DHH) is as diverse as any other group. Some use sign language but many do not. To find out whet their communication preferences are, don't essums, aux them.
- For centuries, communication barriers for many Deaf people have led to incomment daily mistakes, misinterpretation (medical, financial, employment, family, etc.), misdiagnosis, and mistreatment that have caused and continue to cause every imaginable level of harm.
- To combat that history, Deaf people and allies have continuously worked to establish their
 own 'specialty' services and activities to provide respect, understanding, and equivalence.
 This ranges from schools for the Deaf, to Deaf clubs, churches, investment groups, athletic
 teams, Olympics, etc. Thanks to modern technology, the DHH now have their own 958
 Suicide/Crisis line, Domestic Violence hottine, and multiple Deaf therapy organizations.
- Important facts about speech reading:
- Only 30% of English sounds are visible on the lips; the others are made mostly in the throat, tongue, and roof of the mouth. Many words aren't visible on the lips at all.
- Those who benefit most from speechreading tend to be hearing college-educated speakers already fluent in their spoken language – not DHH people!
- · Of course, speechreading English doesn't work at all if English is not your first language.
- Sign language is not a "summary form" of apoken language, nor are sign languages limited in their ability to express humor, science, religion, art, or any intricate or abstract concepts.
- Sign language is NOT universal. Linguists have identified 150—300+ different sign languages
 around the world, most countries have their own regional dislects. So, providing American
 Sign Language (ASL) "interpreters" for Deaf people new to the USA is often as ineffective as
 providing an English interpreter for hearing people who don't know English.
- Although most of the "language line" services in the US have as many as 240 spoken
 languages available, most currently offer only ASL for those who rely on sign language.
 However, some specialty interpreting agencies are now starting to provide some of those
- Native Deaf interpreters are often an effective link between Deaf individuals and ASL interpreters in providing the clarity and nuances needed.
- Around the world, D/HH people function in many of the same roles as those who can hear.
 They are doctors, Lawyers, car mechanics, artists, athletes, parents, scientists, ministers, actors, social workers, Uber drivers, teachers, even firemen and police officers.
- However, some countries still do not allow D/HH people to drive, many one another, raise their own children, work competitive jobs, etc.
- There is no direct connection between being DHH and having mental health challenges or intellectual disabilities. For those that do have these challenges, however, there are far fewer accessible services to assist, and their level of care is often far from equivalent or beat practice.
- However, 95% of Deaf people are born to hearing params who RARELY adapt to them and learn yasial sign language. So, after entire upbringings of language/relationship/learning deprivation modelled within their own families, many Deaf people can struggle with additional challenges that can have life-long consequences, especially without accessible support.
- One of THE foundations of health and human services is COMMUNICATION, but most 'mainstream' agencies don't have the time, expertise, funding, or language ability to provide the very special communication needed for Deaf individuals and families.
- Most larger cities in the USA have sign language interpreting agencies, and a few have minimal specialty MH/IOO human services. However, rarely do any have the desperately needed zervices for the many other isolated and vulnerable Deaf, such as those who are homeless, crime victims, inmates or returning citizens, refugees/immigrants/asylees, Deaffilind, and others.
- Interpretors are not case managers or advocates. In fact, their code of ethics requires that
 they remain impartial, avoid explanation or clarification, and not to "help" except to interpret
 in fact, even though they gain access to the most vulnerable people, their own code of
 confidentiality restricts them providing the connections, referrals, or information that may
 be needed to make connections to needed services.
- The Deaf Community has developed their own stories, legends, jokes, riddles, idioms, stang, folklore, puns, poetry, songs, rhythm, art, films, culture, and other linguistic and cultural expressions to maintain perspective, humor, and dignity within their lives.






Boyertown Lions Club held their annual distribution night at Boyertown Multi Service Center on Spring St Thursday September 19.


